Dear Lake Toxaway UMC Family and Community,

Hospitality is a word that gets used with many types of modifiers or adjectives: gracious hospitality, Southern hospitality or attentive, courteous, amiable, cordial, agreeable, gracious and welcoming. In Christian circles, we began to talk about practicing hospitality a few years ago in terms of radical hospitality and developed programs around welcoming new visitors in worship with a coffee mug and a follow-up phone call. At Lake Toxaway UMC, Coffee Hour served as a hospitality hour. Hospitality even describes several industries: Food and Beverage, Travel and Tourism, Lodging and Recreation.

This week in the Gospel lesson, Jesus speaks about hospitality and there is a phrase that has resonated with me since my days of working in New York City with "latch-key" children in tutoring and enrichment programs. One of the directors of the program reminded those of us who worked in this program much of our ministry with children from at-risk homes might best be described as "offering a cup of cold water to one of these little ones." I have used this metaphor for much of my ministry as a chaplain and pastor. In times of crisis, anxiety, tragedy, offering a "cup of cold water" literally or figuratively embodies the presence of Christ with me as one of Christ's disciples. The simple act may not be significant in my mind, but as the Holy Spirit blesses this act, it becomes a means of grace to the person or persons facing whatever the situation or need. (You have a preview of this week's homily.)

In the context of our nation and world today, Christian hospitality is the "balm of Gilead" we can offer. And to offer hospitality in our present context requires a creativity guided and directed by the Holy Spirit! The Apostle Paul wrestled with the Church at Colassae and its small flock around the supremacy of Christ and Christian ethics, which is another way of guiding our practice of Christian hospitality. Paul summarizes our Christian ethic in this way: "AS God's chosen ones, holy and beloved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, meekness and patience. Bear with one another and, if anyone has a complaint against another, forgive each other; Above all, clothe yourselves with love, which binds everything together in perfect harmony... And whatever you do, in word or deed, do everything in the name of the Lord Jesus, giving thanks to God the Father through Him. (Colossians 3: 12-17)."

I, your pastor, fall short daily in practicing Christian hospitality. I fail to offer simple courtesies and kindness; I judge others quickly; I certainly become impatient. I am thankful God in Christ forgives my failures/sin in my words and deeds. I invite you to join me in seeking to find ways to practice hospitality creatively in the present world environment. I suggest we start by praying John Wesley's Rules of Christian living: *Do NO Harm, Do Good, and Stay in Love with God.* I am sorry if I hurt any of you; my love for you is constant! I want to continue to serve in ministry with you as we worship virtually. I want to be faithful in practicing Christian hospitality to you and to strangers. I believe what Jesus said about a cup of cold water!

The hospitality we receive is related to the hospitality we give. The love we give is related to the love we receive. That is how this works. We cannot scare people into the arms of God, but we can love them there. We cannot force people into the fellowship of the church, but we can welcome them there. This Gospel text tells us hospitality is not an add-on, not an extra in the busy-ness of our mission and ministry. It is core. It is what defines us! (A paragraph in the homily this week.)

May we seek to be disciples who understand a cup of cold water might be a means of grace to invite someone into a relationship with Jesus Christ!

May I also ask you give attention to the announcements in the bulletin (pretty please).

SCRIPTURE READINGS

Genesis 22:1-14

22:1 After these things God tested Abraham. He said to him, "Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am."

- 22:2 He said, "Take your son, your only son Isaac, whom you love, and go to the land of Moriah, and offer him there as a burnt offering on one of the mountains that I shall show you."
- 22:3 So Abraham rose early in the morning, saddled his donkey, and took two of his young men with him, and his son Isaac; he cut the wood for the burnt offering, and set out and went to the place in the distance that God had shown him.
- 22:4 On the third day Abraham looked up and saw the place far away.
- Then Abraham said to his young men, "Stay here with the donkey; the boy and I will go over there; we will worship, and then we will come back to you."
- Abraham took the wood of the burnt offering and laid it on his son Isaac, and he himself carried the fire and the knife. So the two of them walked on together.
- Isaac said to his father Abraham, "Father!" And he said, "Here I am, my son." He said, "The fire and the wood are here, but where is the lamb for a burnt offering?"
- 22:8 Abraham said, "God himself will provide the lamb for a burnt offering, my son." So the two of them walked on together.
- When they came to the place that God had shown him, Abraham built an altar there and laid the wood in order. He bound his son Isaac, and laid him on the altar, on top of the wood.
- 22:10 Then Abraham reached out his hand and took the knife to kill his son.
- 22:11 But the angel of the LORD called to him from heaven, and said, "Abraham, Abraham!" And he said, "Here I am."
- 22:12 He said, "Do not lay your hand on the boy or do anything to him; for now I know that you fear God, since you have not withheld your son, your only son, from me."
- 22:13 And Abraham looked up and saw a ram, caught in a thicket by its horns. Abraham went and took the ram and offered it up as a burnt offering instead of his son.
- 22:14 So Abraham called that place "The LORD will provide"; as it is said to this day, "On the mount of the LORD it shall be provided."

Psalm 13 (Read Responsively)

- 13:1 How long, O LORD? Will you forget me forever? How long will you hide your face from me?
- 13:2 How long must I bear pain in my soul, and have sorrow in my heart all day long? How long shall my enemy be exalted over me?
- 13:3 Consider and answer me, O LORD my God! Give light to my eyes, or I will sleep the sleep of death.
- 13:4 and my enemy will say, "I have prevailed"; my foes will rejoice because I am shaken.
- 13:5 But I trusted in your steadfast love; my heart shall rejoice in your salvation.
- 13:6 I will sing to the LORD, because he has dealt bountifully with me.

Romans 6:12-23

6:12 Therefore, do not let sin exercise dominion in your mortal bodies, to make you obey their passions.

- 6:13 No longer present your members to sin as instruments of wickedness, but present yourselves to God as those who have been brought from death to life, and present your members to God as instruments of righteousness.
- 6:14 For sin will have no dominion over you, since you are not under law but under grace.
- 6:15 What then? Should we sin because we are not under law but under grace? By no means!
- 6:16 Do you not know that if you present yourselves to anyone as obedient slaves, you are slaves of the one whom you obey, either of sin, which leads to death, or of obedience, which leads to righteousness?
- 6:17 But thanks be to God that you, having once been slaves of sin, have become obedient from the heart to the form of teaching to which you were entrusted,
- 6:18 and that you, having been set free from sin, have become slaves of righteousness.
- 6:19 I am speaking in human terms because of your natural limitations. For just as you once presented your members as slaves to impurity and to greater and greater iniquity, so now present your members as slaves to righteousness for sanctification.
- 6:20 When you were slaves of sin, you were free in regard to righteousness.
- 6:21 So what advantage did you then get from the things of which you now are ashamed? The end of those things is death.
- 6:22 But now that you have been freed from sin and enslaved to God, the advantage you get is sanctification. The end is eternal life.
- 6:23 For the wages of sin is death, but the free gift of God is eternal life in Christ Jesus our Lord.

Matthew 10:40-42

- 10:40 "Whoever welcomes you welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes the one who sent me.
- 10:41 Whoever welcomes a prophet in the name of a prophet will receive a prophet's reward; and whoever welcomes a righteous person in the name of a righteous person will receive the reward of the righteous;
- 10:42 and whoever gives even a cup of cold water to one of these little ones in the name of a disciple -- truly I tell you, none of these will lose their reward."

L: Hear what the Spirit is saying to God's people.

P: Thanks be to God!

Let us confess our sins against God and our neighbor.

Perfect Father, worthy Son, uniting Spirit, our love for you is not as worthy of you as it should be. Other loves compete in us for our response to your grace. Our feet have been set upon a new path of life through our baptism into Christ. We admit that we stray from that way, returning to the ways of death that should be left behind. We presume upon your grace by our sinning rather than draw upon the new life that is available to us in union with Christ Jesus. Forgive us for allowing your life and love to go so unrequited, for the sake of your devoted Son, Jesus Christ. AMEN.

- 3. Phone calls to those we do not have e-mail addresses for.


